





What is the main purpose of your visit of the city park?




How would you rate the current state of the park based on these criteria? (1-5 rating)

INSIGHTS FROM PUBLIC CONSULTATION

KEY SITE DEFICIENCIES

Lack of Comfortable Seating – According to many survey participants, the existing benches are insufficient or uncomfortable.

Pollution and Inadequate Maintenance – A significant number of respondents noted that the space is often littered and lacks regular cleaning.

Lack of Greenery and Shaded Areas – Most respondents feel the area is overly "concreted" and requires more trees and vegetation.

Insufficient Weather Protection – Survey comments indicate a lack of adequate shelters to protect users from rain and intense sun.

Inadequate Lighting – Some respondents expressed safety concerns regarding the space during nighttime hours.

PREFERRED IMPROVEMENTS

Need for attractive and diverse social spaces to engage people of all ages;

Additional seating and areas with overhead cover or shading;

Increased greenery and diverse natural zones; use of natural materials; creation of "forest-like" corners;

Requirement for a drinking fountain;

Preservation and restoration of the fountain;

Introduction of art installations and additional attractions;


Improved lighting and waste management; installation of park video surveillance (CCTV).

CORE DESIGN PRINCIPLES

1. Adopting New European Bauhaus principles – **SUSTAINABILITY** through **INCLUSION** and **AESTHETICS**;
2. Design solutions informed by **SURVEY INSIGHTS**;
3. Pedestrian flow analysis, including path width optimization; "**SLOW ALLEY**" passing through diverse natural zones;
4. Preserving the **IDENTITY** and memory of the site;
5. New **SOCIAL SPACES** while maintaining existing ones; inclusion of **ALL AGE GROUPS**;
6. Strengthening local **COMMUNITIES** and supporting established social bonds among residents;
7. Support for the **ARTS**;
8. Orienting most seating areas toward the park; **GREEN BUFFER** toward the boulevard;
9. **INCREASING** green areas, tree count, and biodiversity;
10. Implementation of "dry" gardens with **LOW IRRIGATION** and wildflowers;
11. Use of **NATURAL MATERIALS** and permeable paving.



The new proposal for the 'Gubkite' (Mushroom) fountain envisions restoring its original aesthetic while enhancing the feature with integrated lighting and new water effects. The fountain will be opened up toward the plaza, creating a focal point surrounded by new seating areas and lush green pergolas.



PLAN OF THE PARK



RENDERS



The 'Gubkite' (Mushroom) fountain is the centerpiece of this park. The project aims to enhance visual and physical access to the water, offering visitors new opportunities for relaxation by its edge. To accommodate integrated seating, the pool's footprint will be reduced. The original character of the mushrooms will be restored with black-and-white mosaic detailing. The water feature will maintain a shallow depth of 25cm.



A multi-level drinking fountain (accessible for adults, children, and pets) will be located near the fountain. This area also serves as an entry point to the 'slow' alley, which features a stabilized earth surface. The main ('fast') walkways will be paved with decorative concrete pavers in two colors.



A wildflower meadow zone featuring native grasses and blossoms. This is a sanctuary for quiet reflection and contemplation, offering dedicated spaces for sculptures and poetry installations.



The existing planters will feature three vibrant perennial arrangements. Additionally, new trees will be planted along the green space bordering the boulevard.



The area surrounding the bus stop will feature new greenery, tree planting, and integrated seating spaces.

RENDERS



A space for quality time between parents and children. The play equipment is carefully selected to complement rather than duplicate nearby playgrounds, focusing instead on stimulating roleplay, sensory experiences, and social interaction through natural materials. This is a calm, shaded zone, set away from the boulevard.




The amphitheater and podium offer versatile opportunities for social gatherings, celebrations, and small-scale events. ☺



The sport zone offers opportunities for physical activity and social interaction, including quality time for all ages.




"The Mauritanian meadow is a type of garden that requires minimal maintenance and no daily irrigation, while creating the feeling of a wild sanctuary in the heart of the city.



Active play zones for children (ages 3-7 and 7-12), featuring balance trails with varying difficulty levels, are located near the amphitheater, the roleplay area, and the sport zone.

RENDERS



The park offers various orientations for its social nooks. The bus stop and the pergola area are oriented toward the urban energy of the boulevard and the main path. In contrast, the amphitheater, children's play area, and sports zone are inward-facing, focused on the greenery and their own internal dynamics.



The amphitheater is situated on a new landform—a hill—which serves as a buffer toward the boulevard for the entire zone.



Seating nooks along one of the main paths. The placement of the benches is adapted to the slope of the alley, ensuring they are perfectly leveled.



The new pergola follows a configuration similar to the existing one—providing shelter and shade with climbing plants, additional seating, and a more refined aesthetic.



An area designated for temporary exhibitions, located in the northern part of the site.
